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Oklahoma State University is committed to maintaining an environment that supports the health and wellbeing of its community members, while discouraging the illicit use of drugs and alcohol. OSU demonstrates this commitment through the continuous development of policies, programs, and services that support healthy lifestyles. The intent of this document is to meet the legal requirements of conducting a biennial review and summarize the various activities and programs that occurred OSU as they related to drug and alcohol prevention during the 2018-2019 and 2019-2020 academic years. In accordance with the Clery Act, biennial reports are maintained for seven years.

The Objectives of the 2020 Biennial Review

As required by the Drug Free Schools and Community Act, Oklahoma State University is required to published a biennial review every two years to review the progress of alcohol and other drug prevention measures. This report will meet the six requirements as set forth by the Act.

1. Documentation of all alcohol and drug cases adjudicated at the institution and the accompanying sanctions issued for these violations.
2. Copies of the Policies distributed to Students and Employees
3. Identification of alcohol and drug programming that occurs on the university campus and a summary of their strengths and weaknesses.
4. Review of the university's alcohol- and drug-related policies, procedures, programming, and intervention methods.
5. Procedures for distributing annual Alcohol and Other Drug notification to students and employees.
6. Recommendations for revising Alcohol and Other Drug policies, procedures, programs and overall coordination.

Health Risks of Alcohol and Other Drugs

Alcohol

Mood and behavior change, possible stroke, blood clot, arrhythmias and cardiomyopathy, steatosis, alcoholic hepatitis, fibrosis, cirrhosis, pancreatitis, dangerous inflammation that prevents proper digestion, weakened immune system.

Cocaine

Narrowed blood vessels; enlarged pupils; increased body temperature, heart rate, and blood pressure; headache; abdominal pain and nausea; euphoria; increased energy, alertness; insomnia, restlessness; anxiety; erratic and violent behavior, panic attacks, paranoia, psychosis; heart rhythm problems, heart attack; stroke, seizure, coma. Post effects are Depression, tiredness, increased appetite, insomnia, vivid unpleasant dreams, slowed thinking and movement, restlessness.

Inhalants

Confusion; nausea; slurred speech; lack of coordination; euphoria; dizziness; drowsiness; disinhibition, lightheadedness, hallucinations/delusions; headaches; sudden sniffing death due to heart failure (from butane, propane, and other chemicals in aerosols); death from asphyxiation, suffocation, convulsions or seizures, coma, or choking.

Marijuana

Slowed reaction time; problems with balance and coordination; increased heart rate and appetite; problems with learning and memory; anxiety.

Vaping

Nicotine addiction, mood disorders. Evidence of lung injury and death is linked to vaping use.

Prescription drugs

Sleep medications such as Ambien, Sonata and Lunesta: fever, irritability/life-threatening withdrawal in chronic users. Barbiturates & Benzodiazepines such as Valium, Xanax, Ativan, Amytal: Sedation/drowsiness, reduced anxiety, feelings of well-being, lowered inhibitions, slurred speech, poor concentration, confusion, dizziness, impaired coordination and memory/slowed pulse, lowered blood pressure, slowed breathing, tolerance, withdrawal, addiction; increased risk of respiratory distress and death when combined with alcohol.

Opioids

Codeine (Robitussin), Morphine such as Roxanol, Vicodin, Oxycontin, Percocet: drowsiness, sedation, weakness, dizziness, nausea, impaired coordination, confusion, dry mouth, itching, sweating, clammy skin, constipation/ slowed or arrested breathing, lowered pulse and blood pressure, tolerance, addiction, unconsciousness, coma, death; risk of death increased when combined with alcohol or other CNS depressants.

Stimulants

Concerta, Adderall, Ritalin: increased heart rate, blood pressure, and metabolism, reduced appetite, weight loss, nervousness, insomnia, seizures, heart attack, stroke, rapid breathing, tremor, loss of coordination, irritability, restlessness/delirium, panic, paranoia, hallucinations, impulsive behavior, aggressiveness, tolerance, addiction.

In addition to the various programs and initiatives that are available to our campus community, Oklahoma State University has various different departments and resources for students, faculty, and staff. This section includes various different intervention and treatment options available for students on campus.

Program Inventory

Oklahoma State University utilizes various different methods to deliver its programming regarding the prevention of the illegal use and abuse of alcohol and other drugs. In this section you will find they have been separated into three separate categories; Events, Programs, and Campaigns, Peer Education Initiatives, and Outreach.

Events, Programs, Campaigns, & Outreach

Alcohol Awareness Week

Every year multiple departments from across campus collaborate on the annual Alcohol Education Week. Some of these departments include: The Alcohol and Substance Abuse Center, Oklahoma State University Police Department, Student Conduct Education and Administration, and the Department of Wellness. In the past this week has included presentations on the dangers of drinking and driving through a Victim's Impact Panel or Tipsy Tricycles. It also has hosted presentations highlighting the responsible use of alcohol.

Annual Fraternity and Sorority Chapter Officers' Retreat

Fraternity and Sorority Affairs host an annual Chapter Officers' retreat that addresses risk management concerns and best practices for chapters on responding to risk concerns. These risk concerns can include those related to the illegal use and abuse of alcohol and other drugs, in addition to other areas of risk.

Athlete Presentations

The Athletic Department hosts presentations on alcohol and substance abuse, one for the football team in the Fall, and one for all student-athletes during the Spring semester.

Brew Review

This program is an alcohol education program conducted in collaboration between the Department of Wellness and the Oklahoma State University Police Department. The program consists of a powerful skit that addresses drinking and driving and a facilitated discussion challenging students to create different means to decrease drinking and driving. The discussion also provides information to dispel the misconceptions regarding alcohol consumption on the OSU campus. Campus police officers facilitate a discussion of alcohol laws and violations. In addition, they conduct sobriety and breathalyzer tests on students who have been consuming alcohol under their supervision.

Calf Fry Tent

The Payne County Substance Abuse and Mental Health Coalition partnered with various campus partners to provide a safety tent at the entrance to the 2019 Calf Fry. This tent provided water, cell phone charging, and a place to wait for a sober driver. Due to COVID-19 pandemic, the 2020 Calf Fry event and therefore the safety tent was not operationalized.

Drug Take Back Events

In October 2019, we hosted an Opioid Takeback event and six students returned their prescription medication..

House Director Orientations

Fraternity and Sorority Affairs hosts annual House Director orientation designed to help those directors recognize students who may need assistance regarding the illegal use and abuse of alcohol and other drugs.

Late Night Programing

Various departments on campus provide a multitude of events and programs during nights and on the weekends. While some events focus on the promotion of legal and responsible use of alcohol and drugs, these events also provide opportunities to meet people, and have fun in a safe and alcohol free and drug free environment.

Opioid Prevention Booth

In January 2020, Department of Wellness hosted an opioid prevention booth and reached 102 students.

OSU Police lead Alcohol Education Presentations

Dedicate one officer as an Alcohol Education Enforcement Officer who focuses on prevention efforts directed towards impaired driving by providing approximately 100-125 drug and alcohol educational programs a year.

Presidential Leadership Council Discussion

Presidential Leadership Council facilitates a “family discussion” in which they discuss the responsibility of following the law as leaders which includes abstaining from alcohol consumption until the age of 21.

S.M.A.R.T. Campaign

Oklahoma State University has provided various promotional materials aimed at educating students about the illegal use and abuse of alcohol through its S.M.A.R.T. Campaign.

S.M.A.R.T. stands for:

- **S**et and know your limits
- **M**ake a plan before you go
- **A**ppoint a sober driver
- **R**esponsible means over 21
- **T**hink before you drink

The university has spread this message by handing out S.M.A.R.T. coasters, S.M.A.R.T. stickers, and other educational materials. Student Conduct Education and Administration and the Alcohol and Substance Abuse Center on campus also provide S.M.A.R.T. classes for students who have been found responsible for violating the Alcohol provision of the Student Code of Conduct.

Sober Monitor Training

Department of Wellness and Fraternity and Sorority Affairs collaborated to develop training of sober monitors in attendance at alcohol involved fraternity and sorority sponsored events.

Study Natural

In December 2019, Department of Wellness hosted a “Study Natural” booth that relayed information on opioid abuse during finals week and we reached 184 students.

“What Would Pete Do”

The Student Conduct Education and Administration Office offers a “What Would Pete Do” program that educates students on the responsible consumption of alcohol. The program aspires OSU student to follow five behavioral standards; integrity, community, social justice, respect, and responsibility.

1 is 2 Many

The 1 is 2 Many campaign outlines a clear message that one victim is too many and that Oklahoma State does not condone any form of sexual violence in our campus community. All incoming students regardless of classification must complete an online training, while this training is focused on sexual violence prevention, it does contain components related to the effects of alcohol and other drugs.

Peer Education Initiatives

Greek 100

A student organization advised by Fraternity and Sorority Affairs requires all fraternities and sororities have 95% attendance at various peer-led educational presentations. Up to 100 fraternity and sorority members are the peer educators for presentations on alcohol and drug education, hazing prevention, and sexual violence.

IFC alcohol checks

To ensure fraternities comply with the IFC alcohol policy prohibiting alcohol on property, IFC completes IFC compliance checks. Violations of the IFC policy are addressed through the IFC judicial process.

Share the W.E.A.L.T.H. Peer Health Education Program

Share the W.E.A.L.T.H. is a peer health education program established in response to the health issues concerning Oklahoma State University students. W.E.A.L.T.H. stands for Wellness Educators Advocating Lifestyles Toward Health. The program is comprised of trained OSU students who promote positive health behaviors, increase awareness of campus and community resources, encourage the use of critical thinking during decision-making process and create a support network for students. Peer educators develop, implement, and evaluate health education and awareness presentations and facilitate small and large group programs. Some topics include alcohol awareness, stress management, nutrition, sexual health, LGBTQ+, prescription drug use, and sleep hygiene. The Alcohol Education Program is a 45-minute presentation conducted by a trained peer education and designed to give students the opportunity to analyze personal drinking habits and learn about drinking laws and the consequences of breaking those laws.

Student Wellness Council

The Student Wellness Council is designed to improve the health and wellness of members of the Oklahoma State University community. The council advises and advocates for wellness programs and policies to align with the needs and wants of OSU students. The Student Wellness Council is open to students who are at least second year students, they must have a 2.75 minimum GPA, attend monthly meetings, and have a strong interest in health and wellness. This council serves as a great program for our students to voice their ideas and concerns.

Wellness State Program

The Wellness State Program is an additional component of the peer health education program that is specifically designed for Freshman Orientation academic courses. The primary purpose of this program is to address the specific health needs of new students. Program topics include alcohol awareness, stress management, nutrition, body image, physical activity, personal safety, tobacco, and sexual health. All programs are approximately 40 minutes in length and include an out of class web-based assignment before a classroom presentation.

Administrative Contribution

Responsible Sales and Service Training

Staff members from Department of Wellness offer responsible sales and service training for local alcohol vendors. This training address selling and serving considering state and local laws, checking identifications, and risk reduction of overserving.

Home Football Games

Student Conduct in conjunction with Oklahoma State University Athletic supports and aids in behavioral concerns of students involving the illegal consumption of alcohol at home football games. Student Conduct employees work with OSUPD to eject intoxicated students who have violated alcohol policies from the stadium. The staff will meet with these students at a later date, and if found responsible will give students specific sanctions related to game day. Some of these sanctions include, Game-Day Community Service, Sobriety Check-in station, and a SMART Class.

Prescription Drug Drop Box

OSU hosts a prescription drug drop box inside the lobby of University Health Services.

Opioid Response Grant

The Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education Campus Outreach State Opioid Response Grant has provided us the opportunity to connect with OSU's student body to provide awareness and resources for opioid abuse. We were able to disseminate educational material on overdose prevention, naloxone administration, and access to Substance Use Disorder treatment services and resources. We were also given the opportunity to attend the ODMHSAS Expanding Possibilities Conference in order to learn more about substance use disorder and naloxone. Opioid Takeback event, Study Natural, and Opioid Prevention Booth were all supported through this grant. All additional opioid programming was paused due to COVID 19.

Strengths and Weaknesses

Strengths

- Prevention includes peer educators
- Prevention has been a collaborative approach and not left to one functional area.
- Started sober monitor training
- Built relationships with local event venue, Tumbleweeds
- Advanced tailgating initiatives in collaboration with athletics
- Hired an outside consultant to provide professional recommendations on tailgating
- Established tailgating compliance officers for IFC
- Increased the variety of topics and expanded to prevention on opioids
- Initiated a multi-agency prevention at a large county event, Calf Fry

Weaknesses

- We desire to expand our working group to more community agencies
- Presentations on AOD are not required outside of Greek 100
- Need to increase student involvement in our efforts

Policy Inventory

The following policies are those university policies that pertain to the purpose of this report.

Event Policy – 3.12 (OSU/A&M Board of Regents)

The consumption, possession or service of beer, wine and alcoholic beverages on the university/college campus, in university/college facilities and in university/college housing to include sorority and fraternity housing) is prohibited, except by persons of legal drinking age in the locations and under the circumstances set forth below. However, even in those locations and circumstances where beer and wine or alcoholic beverages may be allowed as an exception to the general policy, the following guidelines apply and must be followed:

1. No social event shall be called by a name that implies alcohol as the only beverage to be offered. (e.g., wine and cheese reception)
2. Whenever alcohol is served at an event as authorized below, there must be readily available non-alcoholic options

OSU-Stillwater

- The privacy of Family and Graduate Student Housing.
- In The Atherton Hotel and its restaurant.
- At special events and functions in the catering venues in the Student Union
- At special events and functions in the OSU Alumni Association Alumni Center Building and confines of any of its attached outside meeting areas
- In connection with collegiate athletic and other special events at athletic facilities:
 - In leased suites and club rooms located in athletic facilities (i.e., Boone Pickens Stadium, Gallagher-Iba Arena, etc.
 - On reserved parking lots/facilities on game/special event days, to include the green spaces within or immediately adjacent to those lots/facilities; and
 - In other areas and circumstances as approved by the Athletic Director and the President.

Nothing contained herein shall be construed to allow beer, wine and alcoholic beverages to be sold in or adjacent to athletic facilities, unless sold by an entity properly licensed by the State of Oklahoma and authorized by the Athletic Director to do so. The Athletic Director shall apprise the Board CEO and Board Chair before authorizing such sales in any new athletic facility or venue.

- At special events and functions in University facilities or on University property as approved by the OSU President, or his/her designee. All alcoholic beverage services must be provided by an entity licensed by the State of Oklahoma to purchase and serve alcohol to the public.
- The tasting of wine, beer and/or spirits in the classroom as a legitimate and strictly controlled part of the requirements of courses offered in the School of Hospitality and Tourism Management provided such activities are approved by the Provost/Chief Academic Officer and are a part of the approved curriculum and authorized class and that such activities are conducted during the regular class periods under the supervision of University approved instructors.
- Production of grape and fruit wines at the Robert M. Kerr Food and Agricultural Products Center (FAPC) and sensory evaluation and laboratory quality testing of wines, either produced in the FAPC or received from industry, are permissible provided that such activities are undertaken for the purpose of supporting approved viticulture and enology teaching, research and outreach activities, and are conducted under the control and supervision of assigned faculty. The approved areas in the FAPC are the Second Floor Processing Area and the Sensory Evaluation Rooms (149, 150, and 151).

Organization Policy –Alcohol (Organization Code of Conduct, II.8)

Alcohol: Student organizations that serve or permit possession of alcoholic beverages at student organization functions, on or off campus, must comply with any and all applicable local, state, and federal laws. This includes serving or allowing minors access to alcohol or providing alcohol to an inebriated individual. Organizations that choose to host social events with alcohol must fully comply with the third party vendor guidelines or with Bring Your Own Beverage (BYOB) guidelines. Third party guidelines and Bring Your Own Beverage guidelines are provided elsewhere in this handbook.

Third Party Vendor Guidelines (Fraternity and Sorority Affairs Handbook)

The vendor must:

1. Be properly licensed by the appropriate local and state authority. This might involve both a liquor license to sell on the premises where the function is to be held.
2. Be properly insured with a minimum of \$1,000,000 of general liability insurance, evidence by a properly completed certificate of insurance prepared by the insurance provider including off premise liquor liability coverage and non-owned and hired coverage, insure the student organization hiring the vendor.
3. Agree in writing to cash sales only, collected by the vendor, during the function.
4. Assume in writing all responsibilities that any other purveyor of alcoholic beverages would assume in the normal course of business, including but not limited to:
 - a. Checking identification card upon entry;
 - b. Not serving minors;
 - c. Not serving individuals who appear to be intoxicated;
 - d. Maintaining absolute control of all alcoholic containers present;
 - e. Collecting all remaining alcohol at the end of a function (no excess alcohol—opened or unopened—is to be given, sold or furnished to the organization);
 - f. Removing all alcohol from the premises.

Bring Your Own Beverage (BYOB) Guidelines (Fraternity and Sorority Affairs Handbook)

1. Individuals of legal drinking age may bring six individually, pre-packaged, standard drink size beverages for personal consumption. The presence of alcohol products above 15% alcohol by volume ("ABV") is prohibited at any event. Any beverage combined with caffeine such as Four Lokos are prohibited. See information about standard drink size and common beverages below 15% ABV.
2. Individuals of legal drinking age that choose to bring an alcoholic beverage for personal use must drop off their beverages upon entering the event. Their beverages shall be clearly marked with their name.
3. When alcohol is dropped off to the assigned distributors the individual's identification must be checked for legal age to drink and then provided a non-adjustable wristband.
4. Alcohol must be contained in one central location and should only be accessed by assigned distributors. The alcohol should not be accessed by guests.
5. Distributors of the alcohol shall be of legal drinking age and sober during the entire event. Distributors must be trained and can not be sober monitors. There should be 1 trained distributor per 50 attendees that are of legal drinking age.
6. When individuals would like to consume one of the beverages they brought, they will need to visit the assigned distributor and show their wristband. The assigned distributor should mark their wristband with an X signifying the accumulated number of drinks provided.
7. Only one beverage may be acquired at a time. 8. Left-over alcohol can be picked up only by the individual that brought the alcohol at the end of the event.

Commonly Below 15% ABV

- Beer (except craft beers, which are often above 15% ABV)
- Wine (most standard red or white wines)
- Champagne, Prosecco, Asti, Cava
- Malt Beverages (i.e. Bacardi Silver, Mike's Hard Lemonade, Zima, Smirnoff Ice, etc.)
- Cider (Angry Orchard, Stella Artois, Woodchuck, etc.)
- Hard Seltzer (White Claw, Truly, Spiked Seltzer, Barefoot Spritzer, etc.)
- Pre-Mixed items (Bud Light Ritas, Skinny Girl Margarita, ELS Iced Coffee/ Iced Chocolate, etc.)

Organization Policy – Drug (Organization Code of Conduct, II.9)

Student organizations must not possess, use, share, sell or otherwise distribute illegal drugs on or off campus

IFC Alcohol (IFC Constitution Article XV, Section VIII)

The use and association of alcohol, illegal substances, or tobacco at any chapter or council community service or philanthropic event is strictly prohibited.

Fraternity and Sorority Affairs Dry Recruitment Policy – Fraternity

No fraternity, organizational member, or potential new member may distribute, consume, or possess alcoholic beverages at any recruitment function.

Fraternity and Sorority Affairs Dry Recruitment Policy – Sorority

All recruitment activities associated with any chapter, without regard to location, will be dry functions (i.e. alcohol and substance-free).

Fraternity and Sorority Affairs – Dry Housing

Fraternity and sorority housing located in the Greek Neighborhood, adjacent to campus is considered approved campus housing and therefore all chapter property and adjoining streets and alleys are alcohol and substance-free at all times similar to Housing & Residential Life alcohol and drug policies.

Housing and Residential Life – Alcohol Policy

Housing and Residential Life policy prohibits the possession of empty alcohol containers. Underage residents may not knowingly be in the presence of alcohol or under the influence of alcohol while residing on campus.

Housing and Residential Life – Drug Policy

Drugs are prohibited in all of our communities. Housing and Residential Life supports drug-free environments to help ensure comfortable, safe, and successful communities. In addition to the Code of Conduct, Housing and Residential Life policy prohibits the use, consumption, possession or being under the influence of drugs.

Student Code of Conduct – Alcohol Policy (II.30)

Consuming, possessing, manufacturing, distributing, selling or serving alcoholic beverages on university premises (including residence halls and sorority and fraternity housing) or at university-sponsored activities regardless of age, except as expressly permitted by university policy. Knowingly being in the presence of alcohol where it is not permitted on campus is also prohibited. The following are also violations on or off campus:

- a) Public intoxication or under the influence of alcohol
- b) Driving under the influence of alcohol or while impaired
- c) Actual physical control of a vehicle while under the influence of alcohol
- d) Providing alcohol to individuals under 21 years of age
- e) Social Host: Providing a location for any individual under 21 years of age to possess or consume alcohol
- f) Transporting an open container of alcohol
- g) Incapacitation due to alcohol
- h) Possession or use of a fake ID
- i) Underage in possession of alcohol
- j) Underage in a liquor (package) store.

Lawful and responsible alcohol consumption is permitted only in designated areas of the OSU campus, properties and facilities as authorized by the Board of Regents.

Student Code of Conduct – Drug Policy (Student Code of Conduct, II.31)

Acting or intending to act to illegally use, possess, sell, share, distribute, cultivate, manufacture or be under the influence of any state or federally controlled drug or substance. Possessing drug paraphernalia. Inhaling or ingesting any substances (e.g., nitrous oxide, glue, paint, etc.) that will alter a student's mental state. Knowingly providing a location for individuals to possess or consume drugs, or knowingly being in the presence of drugs are also prohibited. While the use of medical marijuana has been legalized in the state of Oklahoma, federal law continues to prohibit marijuana. Therefore, the possession or use of prescribed medical marijuana is prohibited on campus property and at University-sponsored activities.

Student Code of Conduct – Good Samaritan (Student Code of Conduct, I.F)

The university may offer amnesty for minor conduct violations to (1) a student who may have committed a minor violation at the time of a more serious incident or (2) a student who offers help to those who need medical assistance. If amnesty is offered, educational options may be explored, but no conduct actions or record will result.

Intercollegiate Athletics Drug Testing

Student-athletes are subject to drug testing within the parameters set forth by this policy. Screening will generally be done by a certified laboratory. Individuals will be subject to undergo drug testing for the following: component of pre-participation exam, random selection, reasonable suspicion/for cause, testing for an entire athletic team, periodic monitoring or aftercare.

Employee Policy

In accordance with the Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1988, Oklahoma State University hereby notifies all employees that the unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensation, possession or use of a controlled substance is prohibited in the workplace. Any employee found to have violated this prohibition may be subject to disciplinary action up to and including dismissal or be required to satisfactorily participate in a drug abuse assistance or rehabilitation program as a condition of continued employment. The drug abuse assistance/rehabilitation program shall be one that has been previously approved for such purposes by a federal, state, or local health, law enforcement or other appropriate agency. The imposition of such disciplinary action or requirement to satisfactorily participate in a drug abuse assistance/rehabilitation program is premised solely upon a violation of this prohibition and does not require a criminal conviction. As a condition of employment at Oklahoma State University, all employees will:

1. Comply with the terms of this statement; and
2. Notify the University (through either their immediate supervisor, other supervisory administrator or project director) of any criminal drug statute conviction for a violation occurring in the workplace in writing no later than five days after such conviction.

Such conviction may, of course, result in the employee being disciplined or required to satisfactorily participate in a drug abuse assistance/rehabilitation program as 1-1205.5 specified above. Failure of an employee to report his/her conviction, as required herein, constitutes grounds for dismissal. As a further requirement of the Drug-Free Workplace Act, the University has established a drug-free awareness program for the purpose of informing employees about the dangers of drug abuse in the workplace, the University's prohibition of controlled substances in and on OSU property, any available drug counseling, rehabilitation and employee assistance programs, and the penalties that may be imposed for drug abuse violations. An Employee Assistance Program has been created in furtherance of the drug-free awareness program. Information about the drug-free awareness program and the Employee Assistance Program may be obtained from University Counseling Services. Reference is made to Policy and Procedures Letter 1-1205 and the Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1988 as sources of information and clarification.

Tailgating Policy

Any OSU fraternity or sorority who wishes to participate in pre-sporting social events (tailgating) that are not contracted by Oklahoma State University Sponsored partners, must fully register and comply with OSU, Fraternity & Sorority Affairs, IFC, and any (inter) national regulations. All events must adhere to OSU Athletics tailgating policy. In addition, no organization can provide a common source of alcohol and must adhere to the Student Organization BYOB Alcohol Policy (with some exceptions).

Accountability Procedures

Student Conduct Process

The responsibility for the campus student conduct system is delegated from the Board of Regents for Oklahoma State University to the Vice President for Student Affairs through the President. The Vice President for Student Affairs further delegates authority for student conduct to Student Conduct Education and Administration, Housing and Residential Life, and designated conduct officers. The goal is to resolve cases by the lowest appropriate authority for maximum educational benefit. To attain this goal, the University utilizes three types of conduct procedures to appropriately address alleged violations of the student code of conduct.

Meeting: Upon determining that sufficient evidence exists to believe that a violation of the Student Code of Conduct may have occurred, the Director of Student Conduct Education and Administration, or another conduct officer with jurisdiction, will notify the student in writing of the alleged violations against them.

Hearing: Hearing procedures are provided for allegations against an individual where suspension from the university is possible, if found responsible. Cases of suspension and expulsion are only processed through Student Conduct Education and Administration.

Committee Hearing: Hearing procedures are provided for allegations against a student where suspension or expulsion from the university is possible, if they are found responsible.

The Student Conduct Committee Panel Hearing shall consist of three disinterested members — one faculty member, one student member and one staff member — selected from the Student Conduct Committee.

Possible Student Disciplinary Sanctions

The following sanctions listed are potential sanctions that students could be assigned if they are found responsible for alcohol or other drug violations. These sanctions are all listed below. The office also has the right to add appropriate sanctions

Alcohol and Drug Assessments: Oklahoma State University offers students the ability to take Alcohol and Drug Assessments from licensed professionals in our Alcohol and Substance Abuse Center located in University Counseling Services. Depending on the type severity of the violation students may be sanctioned to a complete an Alcohol and Drug Assessment. Upon completion of this assessment, any recommendations from the counselor will become the student's new sanctions. Below are the three types of Alcohol and Drug Assessments assigned.

- **Alcohol and Drug Assessment A:** \$160 ADSAC/DUI assessment for DUI or drug-related offenses that results in loss of driver's license. This appointment takes 2 hours.
- **Alcohol and Drug Assessment B:** \$ 100 Court-ordered drug/alcohol assessment for criminal charges that will not result in loss of driver's license (PI, UIP, fake ID, TOC). This appointment takes an hour and a half.
- **Alcohol and Drug Assessment C:** \$50 Non-court ordered University Assessment – Not accepted in court. This appointment takes an hour.

Conduct Expulsion: Termination of student status for an indefinite period. Students who are expelled from Oklahoma State University are not permitted on campus or in university buildings, facilities or activities at any time for any reason, unless otherwise permitted by the Director of Student Conduct Education and Administration. Notation on the transcript is not made; however, a permanent record of the action is maintained in the student's record in the Registrar's Office. If a transcript is requested, a letter will be sent with the transcript to the requesting party/institution

stating the student has been expelled for conduct reasons. Only unofficial transcripts will be released to the student directly. Expulsion becomes a permanent part of a student's conduct record. Any refund of tuition or fees will be subject to the university's normal withdrawal policy.

Conduct Probation: A specified period of time during which the student is placed on formal notice that they are not in good standing with the university and that further violations of university regulations will subject them to suspension or expulsion from the university.

Conduct Suspension: The exclusion from enrollment in classes and other privileges or activities for a definite period of time not to exceed three years and until the conditions which are set forth in the hearing outcome letter are met. Students who are suspended from Oklahoma State University are not permitted on campus or in university buildings, facilities or activities at any time for any reason during the period of suspension, unless otherwise permitted by the Director of Student Conduct Education and Administration. Notation on the transcript is not made; however, a record of the action is maintained in the student's record in the Registrar's Office. If a transcript is requested during the period of suspension, a letter will be sent with the transcript to the requesting party/institution stating the student is under suspension for conduct reasons. Only unofficial transcripts will be released to the student directly. Any refund of tuition or fees will be subject to the university's normal withdrawal policy.

Decision Making Seminar: Through the completion of the Decision-Making Seminar a student will be able to:

1. Learn about the steps to make a well thought out and effect decision
2. Identify how they can incorporate the steps they have learned to make positive decision in the future
3. Identify their core values and reflect on if their values were reflective in their behavior that facilitated this assignment.

Football Sobriety Check-in: Students that are found to be responsible for alcohol violations relating to home football games, are assigned this sanction. They are required to be sober at all times while in the stadium for any future home football games they go to for the remainder of the season.

Game Day/Post Game Day Community Service: Students that are found to be responsible for alcohol or other drug violations relating to home football games, are assigned this sanction. Upon completion of Game Day or Post Game Day Community Service, a student will be able to:

1. Identify the impact that home football games have on the University and their involvement and role in that impact.
2. Define their responsibilities as an OSU student and identify how these responsibilities will factor into their future decision making on game day and in general at the University.

Marijuana Education Class: Through the completion of the Marijuana Education Class a student will be able to:

1. Develop strategies for reducing the risks associated with marijuana use.
2. Understand the federal, state, and local laws surrounding marijuana.
3. Explore the impact marijuana may have on success at Oklahoma State University now and in the future.

Parental Notification: Oklahoma State University reserves the right to notify the parents/guardians of dependent students regarding any conduct situation, particularly alcohol

and other drug violations. The university may also notify parents/guardians of non-dependent students who are under the age of 21 of alcohol and/or other drug violations. Parental notification may also be utilized discretionarily by administrators when permitted by FERPA or consent of the student.

Residence Hall Status Change: The university is able to alter a student's access to residence halls in four ways:

1. **Restrictions** on visitation to specified buildings or all university housing.
2. **Reassignment** to another university housing facility as determined by Residential Life staff.
3. **Suspension** from a university housing facility for a specified period of time, after which the student is eligible to return. Conditions for returning may be specified.
4. **Removal** from living in or visiting any university housing facility.
5. **Restitution:** Is compensation for the damage caused to the university or any person's property on campus. This is not a fine, but rather a repayment for labor costs and/or value of property destroyed, damaged, consumed, or stolen.

S.M.A.R.T. Education Class: Through the completion of the SMART Class a student will be able to:

1. Develop strategies for reducing the risks associated with alcohol consumption
2. Understand federal, state, and local laws surrounding alcohol
3. Recognize the hindrance that your behavior involving alcohol can have on your success at OSU and in the future

Written Warning: An official written notice that the student has violated university policies and that more severe conduct action will result should the student be involved in other violations while the student is enrolled at the university.

Please Note: While these are the most commonly assigned sanctions for alcohol and other drug violations, the Student Conduct office reserves the right to issue additional sanctions to fit the educational needs of students on a case by case basis.
